Critical Thinking

OTF hosted a very successful two-day conference, Thinking About Thinking: Developing Curriculum to Nurture Critically Thoughtful Learners on November 27-28, 2009 in Toronto. This conference was held in partnership with The Critical Thinking Consortium and facilitated by Garfield Gini-Newman.

More than 190 teachers from all of OTF's Affiliates participated in this very exciting professional development activity. President Reno Melatti brought greetings on behalf of OTF. The purpose of the conference, and the whole project, is to support classroom teachers in their own professional learning. By providing teachers with effective strategies and a critical thinking framework, we help teachers improve their classroom practice.

Beyond the introductory two days, teachers will be able to participate in OTF's Critical Thinking program throughout the year. Each

teacher will receive ongoing support. They will have the opportunity to collaborate through the use of wikis and to participate in online conferences presented by experts in the field of critical thinking.


Teachers Gathered to Share Work...



Two hundred and twenty-nine participants in the Teacher Learning and Leadership Program (TLLP) gathered at Sharing the Learning Summit on November 29-30 at the Delta Meadowvale Hotel in Mississauga. The Ontario Teachers' Federation and the Ministry of Education sponsored this unique and exciting opportunity for the individual teachers and teams from the first two cohorts of the TLLP to both share and display their work.

Teachers across the province, in this innovative professional learning program, engaged in action research projects in their schools and boards. Applications to the program were approved by a joint Ministry-OTF and Affiliate committee. The Summit showcased 118 projects, which began in 2008 and were completed in June 2009, demonstrating the success of the projects for students and teachers. President Reno Melatti brought greetings on behalf of OTF. Speakers included: The Honourable Kathleen Wynne, Minister of Education and Annie Kidder, Executive Director of People for Education. Dr. Lorna Earl provided insights into her research on the TLLP professional learning program; and Dr. Samantha Nutt, co-founder of War Child Canada spoke about how individuals can take an idea and make a difference in the lives of others. Participants also had the first public screening of "Taking the Lead", a DVD explaining the initiative and showcasing five representative projects.

In two "marketplace" settings teams had an opportunity to share their learning with interested colleagues. The marketplace was an opportunity for everyone to visit other TLLP participants' tables, ask questions, learn some details about the findings and experiences of others, and possibly see some samples of student or teacher work, communications or other materials. 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A Message from the **OTF** President

International Assistance

For more than 45 years, OTF has been active in the field of International Development. While our efforts are not on the same scale as CIDA or UNICEF, this undertaking is one where small efforts have large impacts. If we are feeling the sharpness of the economic situation here at home in Ontario, we can only imagine how the ripples move through communities that have so little to begin with. We can, however, make some judgments based on the fact that this year we received the highest number and most heartwrenching requests in more than four decades.

The actual work is done by an OTF Committee. Each Affiliate nominates a representative to the committee and OTF staff supports their work. Lindy Amato, Director of Professional Affairs, has had this responsibility since she started at OTF over 15 years ago. Her assistant Margaret Cunningham is as familiar with the stories as any member of the Committee. This year's members are: Alphonse Yongoua, AEFO; Fatma Ibrahim, ETFO; Micheal Wozniak, OECTA; and Marianne Saade, OSSTF.

Last year, we received and processed 279 requests, and provided funding to 128 of these, spread across 20 developing countries. The hardest part of the Committee's work is deciding who will benefit from what, to us, is very small amounts of money. For example:

- \$380 to the Association for Poor People's Livelihood & Employment in Proddatur, Kadapa District, India, to support a day school for 35 children.
- \$650 to the Nomvume Junior Primary School in Alice, South Africa to construct four classrooms, a principal's office, staffroom and toilets.
- \$650 to the Great Knowledge Learning Center in Manila, Philippines, to provide educational supplies and school uniforms for 426 children.

Just imagine, for what we would pay for three months of high definition cablevision, 35 children can go to school for a year in Proddatur, India. Or with \$650 we can build a school in South Africa or buy a fancy mountain bike. The same amount can remove one of the greatest barriers to education for children living in poverty by buying them a school uniform.


Enoch Turner Schoolhouse. On the same day, OTF, in partnership with the Toronto Star, published a Special Supplement in honour of World Teachers' Day.
