
QUEEN ELIZABETH II DIAMOND JUBILEE MEDAL

NO TO TWO YEARS OF TEACHER EDUCATION

OTF and the Affiliates agree that two years of teacher education is not the answer.


However, if the Government is determined to alter the length of pre-service training, the OTF Executive supports a program of three-semesters, offered over 12 months. Ideally, such a program would commence in July and end the following June. There would be 100 practicum days in an Ontario classroom.

As well, the Executive recommends strongly that the method of division specialization (P/J, J/I, I/S) be retained.

There have been several meetings with the government since they announced expanding pre-service for prospective teachers in August 2011. Currently, the Liberal Government has indicated that it will delay implementation of the new program until September 2015.

OTF has much to be proud of as an organization and as teachers collectively. In fact, Ontario is a much sought after jurisdiction—delegations have come from many countries to meet with OTF, the Ministry, and educators to see what Ontario is doing right and why Ontario students perform so well on international measures. A key part of Ontario's success, according to the Ontario Government, has been its collaboration with teachers and its investment in the profession through teacher professional learning. At this time, however, it is unlikely that Ontario's teachers are feeling that same appreciation and respect from the Government.

Over the past year, a number of significant events took place which affect teachers and will for years to come; including the *Drummond Report*, the provincial budget, education grants, the Liberal election promise and subsequent consultations on an extended pre-service teacher education program, and the LeSage review of the Ontario College of Teachers.

In August, we saw the unprecedented return of the Ontario Legislature to enact the overriding of the collective bargaining process for teachers. Although OTF has no responsibility for negotiations, it has a long history of supporting its policy that all teachers have the right to representation in the collective bargaining process and to participate in sanctions. As the Affiliates head into this school year with the task of settling collective agreements, we wish them success.

There is truth to the words that the working conditions of teachers are the learning conditions of students. We have seen Ontario's students thrive in an atmosphere of investment, support and professional collaboration for the past 10 years.

Despite what will be challenging circumstances for teachers this year, OTF will continue to represent the interest of the profession, whenever and wherever the opportunity presents itself. Be proud to be a teacher; you make a difference every day!

OTF Fellows 2012


Since 1964, OTF has awarded fellowships annually to acknowledge service to the organization and to the teaching profession.
