### A message from the

### **OTF** President

#### Colleagues:

We are off and running on a new school year. Like me, you probably look at the calendar and wonder where the time goes. During the last few months, OTF has continued to be actively promoting professional learning for our teachers, defending their interests and ensuring the voice of teachers is heard on the many issues of importance to our profession.

OTF is always at the forefront of effective and timely professional development that is recognized nationally and internationally. In November, OTF's financial literacy conference, attended by over 100 teachers, was a perfect example of professional learning created by teachers for teachers. The timing of the conference made it an ideal fit with the Ministry of Education's new push to bring financial literacy into the curriculum. As I write this, I am attending the Teacher Learning and Leadership (TLLP) summit where teachers create and share ideas that help to ignite the love of learning in our students. Truly inspiring!

We have also been active with issues concerning the Ontario College of Teachers (OCT). As you may have heard, OCT is considering a fee increase of 11-19% that it says will help deal with "increasing costs" at the College.

The reason its costs are increasing is because OCT has expanded its mandate into areas that go far beyond that of a regulator. OTF has learned that this fee increase will primarily help pay down the OCT mortgage... a mortgage on a building located at Bay and Bloor in Toronto, the location of some of Canada's most expensive real estate. I believe that rank and file teachers should not be left on the hook for OCT's financial decisions.

This is unacceptable to Ontario's teachers.

Thankfully, there is a College election just around the corner. Teachers should take interest in their local candidates and pose tough questions on how they will represent us on the College Council.

### OTPP pension enhancements January 1, 2018

The contribution rate for the Plan's active members will be reduced by 1.1%.

Full inflation protection will be restored for those who retired after 2009.

Also, the reduction factor has been lowered for members who cease employment in education in 2018 or later and who elect a reduced pension on a deferred basis.

"All of this comes as good news for our members," stated Chris Cowley, OTF President. "We are restoring benefits and reducing contribution rates while ensuring the Plan remains fully funded."

(OCT) Governing Council on December 7, before they vote on their budget and proposed fee increase. During its 20 years of operation, OCT has increased its fee by 67%. In that same period, OTF's full time equivalent member fee of \$30.40 has stayed constant.

While OCT owns real estate in the expensive Bay and Bloor area, OTF leases office space near Yonge and St. Clair. We are busy preparing to move next month. OTF has reached an agreement with QECO (Qualifications Evaluation Council of Ontario) to share leased office space, one block south of our current location. This allows both organizations to reduce their footprint to keep costs (paid by members) under control.
