Joint OTF-Affiliate submissions & responses

OTF and its Affiliates have been active in creating joint responses and submissions on a range of hot-topic matters including Grade 9 mathematics de-streaming, Grade 10 Civics and Citizenship curriculum review and EQAO's pilot test of the Grade 10 digitized OSSLT.


EQAO's Pilot test of the Grade 10 digitized OSSLT

Given the government's and EQAO's intransigence about postponing the pilot test of a digitized OSSLT, OTF and its

Affiliates issued a joint media release on March 12, calling on Education Minister Stephen Lecce to cancel the pilot test. This garnered media traction and may have influenced more school boards to publicly announce they would not be participating in this year's OSSLT pilot test.

Grade 9 mathematics curriculum de-streaming

The Ministry of Education continues to move toward the de-streaming of the Grade 9 mathematics curriculum, slated for mandatory implementation in September 2021. Earlier this



spring, OTF was invited to participate in a Ministry-sponsored Grade 9 mathematics education stakeholders' roundtable. OTF and its Affiliates elected to submit a joint bilingual response with additional perspectives and feedback about de-streaming and, more specifically, about the Ministry's January draft of *A Guide to De-streaming for Board Leaders*.

Navigating De-Streaming: OTF and Affiliate Feedback on the Ministry of Education's A Guide to De-streaming for Board Leaders (January 2021 Draft) focused attention on concerns related to implementation and training for frontline teachers who will be tasked with implementing the de-streaming policy.

Grade 10 Civics and Citizenship curriculum review

This spring, the Ministry announced it was adding yet another curriculum,



Grade 10 Civics and Citizenship, to the long slate of curricula already scheduled to undergo review, including Science and Technology (Grades 1-8), Mathematics (Grade 9), Science (Grades 9-12), Technological Studies (Grades 9-12), Business Studies (Grades 9-12) and Computer Studies (Grades 10-12).

OTF, together with AEFO, OECTA and OSSTF, submitted joint feedback in response to the Ministry's initial phase of the curriculum review process, which focused on soliciting information about the current version of the Civics and Citizenship curriculum and course.

Given the Ministry's obvious penchant for committing numerous curricula to its curriculum review process, OTF and its Affiliates will continue to press Ministry leadership and staff about our concerns with a rushed process with unfeasible timelines for consultation, feedback, release and implementation.

Dear colleagues,

As the end of the school year quickly approaches, OTF celebrates Ontario's educators for all that they have accomplished during the past year, in the face of adversity and despite what they have endured from the current government, in an effort to keep Ontario's students progressing towards educational success.

OTF has advocated against the imposition of EQAO testing at the secondary level during this difficult year, and we have repeatedly demanded that the Minister shelve his plans for the ill-conceived Math Proficiency Test for new teacher graduates.

OTF reluctantly agreed last fall to relax the 50-day reemployment rule for pensioners during the current school year, recognizing that this would not solve potential supply issues created by the government. However, we now have thousands of new teacher graduates available to assist and eligible for Permanent Teaching Certificates, but for having to successfully complete the Math Proficiency Test by the end of August (just extended to December 31, 2021). At OTF, we look forward to a "new normal" and the return of business and social interactions. Unfortunately, our Annual Meeting in late August will occur online for the second year in a row. As a result, we have had to postpone the in-person celebration of our newest OTF Fellowship recipients to next spring. In the meantime, we congratulate our 2021 OTF Fellows (highlighted in this *Interaction*)!

With the summer months now clearly in sight, I encourage everyone to continue following public health advice while supporting your families, your colleagues and your communities in staying safe and healthy.

OTF Math Office Hours

Beginning teachers must pass the Math Proficiency Test (MPT)

To support beginning teachers and teacher candidates with the stress of completing the government-mandated MPT by August 31, 2021 (just extended to December 31, 2021), OTF is offering an online program, OTF Math Office Hours.

OTF Math Office Hours gives beginning teachers and teacher candidates the opportunity to ask questions about math concepts and procedures and to receive support from a teacher qualified in math. The sessions are every Wednesday afternoon/ evening until August 11 and last approximately 90 minutes. Users can log in at any point during the time slot and attend as many sessions as they wish.
